This was a more complicated conference because we sought to make clear that the challenge laid down by the Universal Declaration of Human Rights

<u>http://www.un.org/en/universal-declaration-human-rights/</u>applies to the United States, not only the foreign countries that Americans often criticize.

We needed to confront America's history of African American slavery as well as US mass incarceration. We sought to consider restorative justice in the US as well as those in war torn Rwanda, Sierra Leone and South Africa.

In all these, the basic principles of love, justice and human rights needed attention.

We also sought to bring together scholar-specialists with practitioners directly confronting these issues in the US and elsewhere.
